That just breaks my heart. First of all, then we find out that there's all these problems in the printing of the books themselves. People finding out that there was this one woman she had, like she's reading it's page 34. And then the next page is page 83. Oh, Lord, and then it's like another 50 pages. And then it starts over again at page 83 And then goes on from there. I mean, these are just things that should not be happening. I mean, we've got seen upside down spines, we've seen the sprayed edges being not really that sprayed, I mean almost looking kind of dirty, instead of nicely sprayed. I just I'm so boggled. I'm not angry about it. I'm I mean, I'm angry about the problems that have happened, especially with the indie bookstores, and with readers who really want to get their hands on this book that all of us have. So been looking forward to, and then to have all these problems happen, and so many people be disappointed and I'll bet you that Rebecca Yarros herself is just so upset sleep. Yeah, I mean completely because none of these things are within her control, or her power to stop any of these things from happening. And yet here she is having to go do these events and do her social media and then people in the comment sections of those things are just understandably upset and fired up and it's just a mess. and it makes me crazy from a business perspective. And from a reader perspective, it just makes me absolutely crazy. So put all that together, I finally got my copy that I had pre ordered of both Iron Flame. So when you see things like that, like the spine being printed upside down, or the spine being on like cockeyed with regard to the gold foil that's on it, or an extra signature where there shouldn't be one, it's almost always a result of human error. So that means somebody was walking down the printing press line, and maybe picked up a book to look at it and set it back down the wrong way with regard to the cover. And so that's how stuff like that happens. It rarely is because the machine itself screwed up. Otherwise, every book would be or it would be identical. Yeah, a giant mess of books would all have the same problem. And instead, you're seeing like this, Rando got this issue. And this Rando got this issue. And that's almost always because somebody was walking through there and messing with the printing line, basically. So I'm guessing that's because whoever was working at the printing press is very excited about this book, and should and has put their hands where they shouldn't have been, basically. So that's like, that's the publishing insider knowledge that I know about at this point, that it's probably not even the publisher itself that did wrong here, although they have under delivered and not ordered enough and rushed to print. But the actual, like issues you're seeing with the printing itself, where people are getting mistakes is because somebody in the publisher, in the actual printing house was touching things. I

so I am bringing an indie press list book, I know where we didn't intend to talk about indie press lists a lot. And it's from October. And I know we normally try to leave more time in between. But here's the thing, I think this book is going to be one of my top 10 books of the year. And so one of the things that we need to do is we need to give it a treatment on the show, so that when we have our best of episode, it will make more sense there will be more context. So I have to talk about Slewfoot by Brom, just Brom just Brom and that he doesn't need any more than that because he is that good. Alright, here is the setup. Our setting is Connecticut in 1666. We are in the middle of a village of Puritan settlers. Our lead characters Agatha, who is recently widowed, and through circumstances definitely not of her choosing, she has been outcast from the village. She has very few choices and scant chance at survival. But then, she comes into contact with an ancient spirit in the dark woods behind her home the wild folk called the Spirit Father and to them he is a protector, but the colonists call him Slewfoot and to them he is a fearsome devil to Agatha. He's her only choice, he's the only one that she can turn to for help. So Agatha and Slewfoot join forces, and they are helped in sometimes hindered by the wild folk. And they face a battle between pagans and Puritans in this battle for hearts and minds will leave a village on fire and awash in blood. All right, I had not even remotely heard of this book. Until I was chatting one night with Chiara and Betsie, two of my bookish friends. And they casually mentioned that they had just buddy read a book that was dark fantasy with magic, and witches and animals that had children's faces. Imagine the gigantic record screech happening because I was like, wait, wait, what? And I forced them to tell me much more. And I immediately sitting there in the room, I bought the book. And when it arrived, I started it like I dropped everything. And I started it. The cover is so beautiful and so dark. And it just beckoned me in in the most witchy magical way possible. And also, again, you have to buy the print edition here the author Brom also illustrates it. And it is gorgeous. The full color illustrations really help you sink into the story. So you can imagine then, how excited I was when this was a pick for October's Indie Press List from Novel Neighbor. They had no idea I had read it, I had no idea they were going to choose it. It was absolute book of serendipity. And I squealed with delight because I couldn't wait to share this book with all of our bookish friends. I love a Puritan story because Puritans are so easy to hate. And Brom brings us a village full of Puritans that from the first chapter I wanted to see get their faces eaten off. They are truly terrible, and they're perfect foil is our lead character Agatha. She is smart and independent and has lots of thoughts in her head. Just exactly what these Puritans do not like in their young women and the battle is set. This book is far less fairy tale and more dark, dark folk tale. There's magic, but it's guieter and more natural and organic in its origins. This isn't light, bright, shiny avatar. This is magic that lives in toadstools and beneath rocks and in the dappled sunlight low in the canopy. This is magic with some spirit and dirt in it and I was all for it. I should say because I want to be clear that this book is very violent, especially toward the end. So our HSP friends should tread really carefully. But Slewfoot is a masterpiece. It's incredibly evocative of its time. Remember, we're in 1666, but it's themes resonate today. If you'd like feminist rage, you get it here. I ended this book wanting to grab a large heavy stick and kick some Puritan booty. I loved it. This is Slewfoot by Brom.

Okay, so this is the second in a middle grade series that Meredith first brought us on the show a couple of years ago, I want to say now, this series is called the Cassidy Blake series, which is dumb, but it starts with City of Ghosts, which is great name. Yeah. In the series, we meet Cassidy Blake, which is why the series is named after her, but I don't like it. I think they should have called it the city of ghosts series. She is the daughter of world famous ghost hunting parents. They travel all over the world to find paranormal activity for their TV show, which is all well and good. But Cassidy is the one who can actually see ghosts and cross the veil into their world. I picked up the second in the series because I was going to

travel to Scotland, which is where the city of ghosts takes place the first novel in the series, but guess what? Remember when I said they traveled all over the world? Well, my time in Scotland was lovely. But this novel takes place in Paris, which is evident if you look at the cover of the book, and you realize there's an Eiffel Tower silhouette front and center. Good job que no worries though it was still an excellent addition to the series. Here's the setup. In Book Two, Cassie and her ghost best friend Jacob are in Paris where her parents are filming their TV show about ghosts and paranormal cities. That means their journeys take them underground to the catacombs which run below the streets of Paris and are filled with centuries of dead people. Cassidy loves visiting the city of lights and eating croissants and visiting the sights and seeing the Louvre Of course there are truly dangerous ghostly figures lurking in the city. And she awakens one on accident obviously. This ghost requires that she solve a mystery along with Jacob and a new acquaintance she meets within the city. Together the trio has to vanquish the spirit before it grows strong enough to do them real harm. While this book didn't match up with my travels this fall it did call me back to when I was a teenager being dragged around very willingly, I'll add by my own parents, including to the streets of Paris and the catacombs underneath the city. Victoria Schwab does a fantastic job transporting us to the musty and dank tunnels that are lined with ossuaries were the bones of the city's dead reside. I love this kind of creepy, middle grade genre which is right on the edge of what you can hand to every middle grader and hand to every adult. If you like being gently terrified by your books, gentle terror, like gentle terror, gentle terror, right? This entire series is the way to go. If you'd like a little more creep, you might pick up The Night Gardener or The Screaming Staircase or 100 Cupboards. But if you want to read a story or a series together with your kids are you just not the reader who needs the full T T square experience? This is going to be the perfect fit for you. Well, I can say I enjoyed the first book in the series slightly more, this was still a solid entry. And I'm looking forward to picking up the third and final book in The Cassidy Blake series, which is called Bridge of Souls. And I'll probably do that next year. But right now I'm making a mental note that it takes place in New Orleans. So hopefully I can match up my place and my expectations a little better next time. This one is called tunnel of bones by Victoria Schwab.

After a series of low level jobs in the New York publishing world, Harper Cruz is out of money and desperate to make enough money to make her rent predictably, she just wants to be able to make it in New York and she would love to have a job where she had a sense that her input actually mattered. So when she stumbled across a job posting from an influencer, offering her triple her last paycheck and company culture, culture culture, she automatically submits her resume. At the start. Harper isn't familiar with self help guru Charlotte green, but her relentless optimism and charismatic can do spirit has created a cult like following of women across the country. And when Charlotte green selects Harper among 1000s of other applicants in less than 24 hours, it's obvious that Charlotte sees something that she likes. And despite the pressure to accept the offer very, very quickly, Harper decides to throw caution to the wind and become the newest member of what is called the Green House. And that means a move to Nashville and right into the heart of the glamorous world that Charlotte Green has built. In Music City. The green house is more than a workplace. It's a family think capital F and an exclamation point. And Harper soon find herself swept into this inner circle. You can see where this is going. At first, she loves working in such an inspirational environment with their surprise dance parties and daily intention setting and group bonding activities. But there's also very long hours and Charlotte's persistent demands for loyalty. And the deeper that Harper is pulled into Charlotte's world, the more Harper realizes that having it all comes with a price. All right, this book got a lot of hype when it came out because its author worked as a branding executive, for none other than Rachel Hollis girl, wash your face or washer. But what? Okay, yeah, what was her? What was her book,

And given what I know about the Rachel Hollis story, which I'm going to admit, I have done a couple of deep dives on this book. Certainly hews really closely to what people say happened in Rachel Hollis this company, and it was under the influence was definitely an interesting read. It's very juicy, and it reads like someone with a chip on her shoulder. And if you're in the right mood, it's page turning as heck. The short chapters and near constant action are certainly another reason that I read this book in one sitting. And also I read it fast because it's a book that is in a pretty negative headspace. I wanted to shout over and over again to the lead character when she was thinking one thing internally, but then doing another thing externally, that drives this reader batty. The other reason that this book was only three stars for me is that it comes from a very specific point of view as it had to do with things related to work and work expectation. There's a lot of talk and complaining in this book about long hours, but I found myself thinking Come on, what did you think was going to happen? That's how these big companies get big. And also they offered you triple your salary. Did you not think there was going to be some sacrifice at the other end of this? She was just that Harper was just so incredibly entitled throughout the story. And also she was constantly complaining about certain things, but then also complaining about the opposite of those things. And that drives this reader really, really batty. So don't get me wrong, I was glued to this book the whole time. And I absolutely wanted to know what was going to happen. And I was very interested in the many details that we get about what it's like to

actually work for or be an influencer at this level. I knew it before but I definitely know it now. It's not a job that I want. It seems exhausting. I will say that if you love The Devil Wears Prada and stories like that, when you will find a lot to be interested in here. But between the whiny tone and the overly tidy ending, this one did not work for me. This is Under the Influence by Noelle Crooks. Have you heard about this one at all Kaytee

Yes, for sure. Okay, my next one is by an author I really love it's The Wind Knows My Mame by Isabel Allende. So this was Isabel Allende's 2023 release. She's one of my favorite writers of a very specific historical literary fiction. That's like she has this perfect little niche. She's carved her spot and it's exactly Isabel Allende shaped, and she fills it very well. This one was excellent. It felt very much within her regular wheelhouse to me. So let's see what y'all think. We started in Vienna in 1938. World War Two, where we meet young Samuel Adler. He is a prodigy who plays violin like a teeny, tiny Angel. When his father disappears during Kristallnacht. His mother sends him on one of the last Kindertransport trains leaving Nazi occupied Austria. Jewish children were sent on these trains to the United Kingdom to help keep them safe as the war started to escalate. He boards alone with only his beloved violin and a single change of clothes for company. Our second storyline starts in 2019 in Arizona, Anita is the protagonist kind of of that one. She's seven years old, and she's blind. She and her mother board a train a different one, obviously from El Salvador fleeing for their lives to seek refuge in the United States. Their family is separated because there are new policies at the border, and Anita is blind and alone in a refugee camp

in Nogales. She is unable to see but she has a fantastical imagination, which allows her to mentally escape the horse around her. Thankfully, her case is assigned to Selena Duran. She's a young social worker who has been trying to get top law firms in the area to join in a pro bono Crusade for Justice for these families that are being separated at the border. These two stories will come together as they develop into this historical and contemporary novel. Isabel Allende had me fully believing that if I went to look up Anita Diaz, I might be able to find a girl who's now 11 years old, I might be able to travel to the city where Samuel Adler lives now as a very old man, by the end of this book, during the pandemic, and knock on his apartment door. These characters felt very real and fully drawn to me. It wouldn't surprise me in the slightest to run into them, and feel like we already know each other pretty well. In the same way I nd invites us to care about situations and connections that may not have touched our lives otherwise. I've lived on this southern border of the United States for almost all of my life. All but three years of my life. I've lived in either Arizona or New Mexico, but I've never visited my migrant camp. I've never have been inside a border facility for refugees. I've only seen small bits and pieces on the news. Even though this all happens in my own backyard. Isabel Allende's research and travels within this book gave me the opportunity to see inside those two very separate historical events with new eyes. And that's what makes me love historical fiction, especially ones that take place outside of a certain period of time. This novel allowed me to travel through time, and across half the world with her characters. And I really enjoyed it. So while it felt like, Yes, this is typical Isabel Allende, it was also exactly what I was hoping to get from her. This was The Wind Knows My Name by Isabel Allende.

Sarah Purcell is pretty sweet, 16 and white. So when she disappeared without a trace on a crisp April morning in Frederick, Maryland, the story completely predictably, becomes a national obsession. And even more interesting, it becomes the center of a very controversial television Docu series that follows her disappearance in real time. In real time, like within just a few hours of her disappearance, there is a crew on site. As our story opens, it's 10 years later, 10 years after the disappearance, and an unnamed reporter is writing an oral history of what happened. And so we get the clues a little bit at a time, but who can we believe who had an agenda? Who's hiding something? Author Sweren-Becker never lets you get confused. Every time the narrative changes the name and the occupation of the person telling this part of the story is identified for you. And everyone wants to talk. There are Sara's teenage friends, the detective, the reality show producer who made that Docu series, and to deal with the girl's parents, a TV critic and lots of other people in town at the time of the disappearance. The author uses them all to tell the story and also to comment on the larger issues of reality shows the people who watch them

and the people who produce them. Alright, Roxanna saw this book, before it even came out. And she sent me something saying, I feel like this is right up your alley, my friend. And she was absolutely right. This book isn't long, but it packs a punch. It is the riveting story of a missing girl. Yes. It's also a story of a family going through the unimaginable. It's the story of the police doing their best to try to find said missing girl. And it's the story of a female producer and her drive to both find the truth and make a viral hit television series. And it's that last part where this book really shines. It's a great what happened sort of book don't get me wrong on that. But it also brings to the table a very nuanced look into how true crime documentaries and reality shows are produced. And spoiler, they aren't always looking out for the victim and the victim's family. The way the book is constructed as an oral history is very, very interesting. We're getting more of these, and I love it. I love how from the start. You're getting the story, but you're also getting little asides. Have you going wait, what? What did they just say? And what does that mean? It was so interesting and perfectly paced. I read it in just a couple of hours. And it's not long, so you can just gulp it down. If you love to crime, you will love this. If you love behind the scenes of reality shows, you will love this. And if you love to be a fly on the wall as shocking things go down. You will absolutely love this. This is Kill Show by Daniel Sweren-Becker.

This is so kitschy. I am so excited to talk about this. Most of us probably know but maybe not everyone that Tom Felton is an

actor who is most known for playing Draco Malfoy in all eight Harry Potter films. I picked up his memoir at Foyles in London, because I was at Foyles in London. And then I decided to read it shortly after I got home. This memoir follows his life from his birth into a family of rowdy brothers with parents who adored each of them and worked hard to make ends meet. He chronicles his first roles in commercials and in film, including when he was cast in the borrower's and war, this horrendous red wig, and worked alongside actors that he now realizes as an adult were giants in the industry, but he just didn't grok that at the time. He was like, well, that's just Jodie Foster no big deal. Right? You're like, no big deal. I 12 years old, when he auditioned for the Harry Potter franchise, he hadn't read a single book in the series, he went to a huge casting call with hundreds of kids. And his inherent 12 year old tween isness made him a really great fit for the part and caught the eye of director Chris Columbus immediately, I'd say about 60% or more of this book is about his time growing up as a wizard, because he's my age or a little younger. It's a huge part of his life. We're talking about eight years of the 35 at the time, he had lived on this earth. This is a huge budget, world renowned film, and he had to balance his life between trying to be a normal kid, and trying to be a world famous actor at the same time. And of course, that isn't easy. He shares stories from behind the scenes, pivotal moments with the phenomenal actors of the series. And the times he caused trouble on set, especially with Crabbe and Goyle. His to like trouble causing buddies in flutter in house. As the series comes to a close, he finds himself drifting a bit. He's being offered roles without trying out and then trying out for roles and getting no offers. He's trying to find his footing again, and starts really struggling with alcohol consumption. He's young, though, like I said, and this memoir feels a bit like what I like to call a messy middle memoir, in that he's hopefully got a lot of life still left to live, and many more lessons to learn. I don't think I have it in me to write a memoir right now at 39. Because hopefully, I've got a lot more to learn before I'm ready to distill it onto the page. But I really enjoyed taking a peek inside the life of a child actor who has become one of the more recognizable faces of my generation, which as a reminder, I'm a millennial, and absolutely loved looking through the photo inset included in this book, to really bring the stories to life, including him in that horrible red curly borrower's wig standing next to Jodie Foster. It was a delight. I loved hearing it in his voice. So I did of course pick up the audio but also enjoyed looking through those photos and rereading select stories out loud to my kids in my own voice, because I had the paper copy that I purchased at Foyles.
