I did. Kaytee got me on that currently reading tracker, I didn't do it in 2022, and then got FOMO and did it at the end of the year, and learn so much. And I remember that last episode of 2022 being like crap, these guys have, like amazing insight into their reading. And so I did it for all of 2023. My method is I quickly added in Goodreads, and then I go every four or five books, and then add the stats on just the columns. that mattered to me in the reading tracker. So I was able to track that. And I'm glad I did. Because I had a very singular year this year. It was an interesting year, I went on a bit of a kind of midlife journey in terms of just kind of re looking at a lot of my life, like my professional life and my identity as a in my career and also in home life. And we bought a new house and change jobs and did a lot of stuff that required a lot of soul searching, which was really, really great and really needed. But it really did have an impact on my reading. So when I looked at my stats back from last year, I'll keep it really kind of short and high level. But I read 83 books last year, which is more than usual, just reflecting kind of what I was going through in life. I had 20 5 star books, which honestly like this is why the tracker is good, because I was like, Yeah, I had a mare reading your I'm sure it was fine. And then I looked back and I was like No 20 5 Star books, another 19 were between 4.25 and 4.5. And another 12 or four star. So it was like the best year that I've had. And so that helped me appreciate that. Yeah, I read a lot of damn good books this year and made this list really hard to choose from. So I thought that was really fun.

I read 30% romance. And I didn't hit for me like I love romance. But I think I read too much, because it was easy to get into. And then the payoff wasn't there. So that was one of my you know, out of that data. I was like, Okay, I'm gonna read less romance in 2023. And I did you know, I read about a third of general fiction, which is the same I read 20% mystery, which was the same, but I read half of the romance I did last year. And that was great, because then I read more memoir, which I love. And I also read a whole host of new genres like sci fi, speculative fiction, fantasy, self help. There's a lot of kind of learning this year business books, and that made my reading life really varied, I think and that really helped me have a lot of five star books, I realized I like change and I like contrasts. So if I'm reading the same or something, I need to switch it up. And that's where those five star books come in. So yeah, that was my reading life. I read 24% POC authors, I'd like to get even higher this year. But overall, I was really, really happy with how my reading you're meant this year. What about you, Mary, how was your year?

I love that. Well, I mean, it comes to no surprise me, you know, to anybody who's listened to any episode with me since March that my reading year was really impacted by the loss of my dad. So I will say I started off strong with my reading tracker and then after March it just kind of that was one of the first things that you know, the non essential things have to go but I am reinvigorated and excited to get back to tracking again this year. And I will say this Roxanna, That's something that was really fun for me in 2023 is we started doing chapter book read alouds with my daughter, and I don't track those on my goodreads, maybe I was thinking now that we're reading more and more of them, I was like, well, I should, I don't know. But where I was tracking them was in my, you know, the reading tracker, which friends by the way, I'm realizing as we're talking about this, if you're not familiar with the reading tracker, this is a bonus for our patrons comes out in January. So that is this magnificent tracker that we're talking about. And I put all of those books that I read with my daughter, those chapter books in the reading tracker. And that was really fun to to start to see the way that my reading life has expanded in that way this year. So even though the details on that kind of fell off for me after March, it was even just those first three months of the year gave me some really good and interesting insight. And you know, my total this year has was 79 books, which I think is pretty, pretty good for hard year is a little bit lower

for me than normal, definitely lower than my highest a couple of years ago, really before kids, right. But all in all, I too felt like you said Roxanna is that I think I had a really good reading your my reading really met me where I was this year. And it was really very, you know, I said on my bite sized intro that my top 10 List surprised me. And there's more nonfiction on this list than I think there ever has been. Since I've been tracking. My reading really was very this year. You know, I our listeners will hear this in just a moment. But I read a lot of books with grief themes. But also, that's really what I needed. I did have you know, plenty of escape when I needed it within my fiction. But I also did lean into some harder, darker, sadder heavier books than I have since the pandemic right in 2020. I think I just read straight fluff all year long. And this year, I was really needing to see my experience, and my emotions mirrored right in front of me and my books, I needed them to be a mirror that way. And as a result of pursuing that I feel like my my reading year really served me it met me exactly where I needed to be. And I feel really satisfied with this list. I feel like my reading really gave me what I needed it to this year. So I'm really excited to hear what came up for you. And I'm excited to share these.

So it was really beautiful. And obviously the fact that's the queen is just the icing on the cake. Right? It is really beautifully written. It's really relatable for anybody who, you know, has a reading challenge them. I think it's also light and short and subversive and funny and smart. And the ending is completely ludicrous. And it was just such a fun, offbeat book that I read on my

commute to work and I enjoyed it so much more than I thought I would so that's the uncommon reader by Alan Bennett.

And that doing Yeah, that little concept is basically the foundation on which this book is written is how much are you resisting what's coming up for you? It is at the core of a lot of the work I do right as a professional but also it's something that I need to constantly be reminding myself as a human being as well as am I just letting myself be in my experience right now? Am I resisting that which is hard? Or am I just kind of letting myself flow with it? I absolutely loved listening to Sylvia Boorstein with her congenial and wise way about her her adorable accent. Just, you know, just take me to church on anxiety and suffering and the ways in which we make this world so much harder on ourselves and we need to I loved it. I'm probably going to listen to this book on a yearly basis. It has just found such a place in my heart. You do not have to be I'm not Buddhist, I just found it very enlightening and interesting and lovely. And it was just such a warm and wise sharing of knowledge. It's pretty backlist. I think it was written in the 90s Maybe, but absolutely still feels relevant and current for this day and age that we're living in this very anxious place. So, you know, I said this year, my year was very varied in terms of the kinds of things I read. And every now and again, I really do like to blast my palate with something totally different. You know, it helps me wake up from reading the same book over and over. And so sci fi novellas are like that chili pepper blast that I need in between more of the general fiction. So this book, as I said, it's about nuns in space, they live in this giant slug, it sounds really campy, but it's not, it's actually a lot more than that the book opens on an order of nuns that live on the edges of the galaxy. And they're really out there ministering to the different planets where all these different populations live, and just sort of helping them get through their days. And then they get a call from the Roman Catholic Church, which still exists on earth, saying, listen, we're tightening up our processes, we want you to be not processes, but like we're tightening up and making sure we are monitoring all the different ships out there doing our work. And we want to make sure that you're converting people and doing the good work of the Roman Catholic Church. And these nuns are not having it. You know, they've been out there for a long time, they've got their, their ship, I think it's called Our Lady of Impossible Constellations, it's got an amazing name. And they just tried to evade this young priests that's coming to kind of get them in order, because, you know, they recognize that what they need to be doing out there on these planets is really helping these populations. So you're kind of feeling the dread from this priest coming in what's going to happen there. And then, while that's happening, they get a distress call from a nearby planet, and find that it's been overtaken with a sickness that turns people into zombies. So all these kinds of plotlines come together. And what they discover is that there's a huge conspiracy involving the whole space system in the government. And it's really, you know, can this small order of unimportant nuns change the course of the galaxy? That's what this book is about. This was the most surprising book I read this year. It was 176 pages long. And it was a character study, a romance, a sci fi, and a horror book like the last third had me so freaked out, I said on our video, I was looking up on the subway to make sure I was still planning to meet other people, zombies murder zombies running after because I was so scared. It was so shocking to me how this book could take me through so many emotions. And it ended with Mary, you talked about a book where there were two pages that really kind of resonated with you. The last two pages of this book, The ending is so resonant and it filled me with such hope. And it's about how a small group of people or how one person can make a difference against the tide of injustice and evil in the world. It was just incredible. This was one of the wildcard picks from my October autumn spoopy reading guide if you are a friend of mine on Instagram, and while I haven't brought it to the big show yet I know that I want to eventually because this book was an absolute sleeper hit Saturday Night Ghosts Club read to me like if Claire Keegan wrote Stranger Things to be a literary fiction novella. I swear this is the weirdest comp that I could ever give. But it is the most accurate description I could possibly think of. This is a coming of age novel that follows a group of misfit kids who spend their summer break investigating local ghost stories and urban legends. With uncle Calvin, he's uncle to one of the kids in the group, what starts off as kind of a fun and lighthearted project to wait to spend their summer turns into this spectacularly beautiful reflection on the losses that we carry the love we have for those who matter most and the ghosts we leave behind. I want so many people to read this book when I shared my reading guide in October those fall, kind of spooky reads I said if you are not someone who's going to pick up the latest witchy romance or if you are seeing all these kind of popcorn thrillers coming out in the fall, and you're wanting something more literary, you're wanting something that's really going to sink its teeth into you. This is that book. It is not very long. It's really pretty quick. You could read it in a day or two. But the way that Craig Davidson packs such a story into this really short amount of pages is spectacularly beautiful. That has stayed with me and will continue to stick with me. And you said the romance part was okay, but the grief part really hit you. And then Kaytee said that about Happy Place. And you just said that. That's what Small Change was for me. So this book is about an over ambitious tattoo artist who owns her own shop in Philadelphia. And she's tough and she's independent. And she's trying to juggle being the boss having this LGBTQ tattoo shop, but also having this career as an artist, and a guy comes into our life. He's a sandwich shop owner, he wants to take care of her he wants to support her. And she's not sure she has time for him amongst all her busy goals. And that really starts her down a path of questioning, like, why does she have these goals? And what are her values? And are the values that she set for herself? Or are the values that other people set for her? And what does she want her life to look like? And that's exactly where I was this year. And so that book really did hit me right where I felt it so it was just, I'm finding that romance books are now almost my new self help books. I don't want to read a self help book, but seeing a character struggles through the same issues I'm struggling through in a messy way. Really, it's like walking the same path with your best friend except you're right in their brain. So it really helped me kind have uncovered some truths about myself and really get to what mattered to me. And it was just a really great book. It also taught me about the tattoo industry and, you know, misogyny in the tattoo industry and all these things I would not know if I hadn't read it. So that's Small Change by Roan Parrish.

This doesn't necessarily sound like a super cheerful book to pick up and read. But whether you have your own grief to contend with, or you just want to love and understand the grief of somebody you care about, or maybe like me really love books that make you feel things about being human, pick this one up, I feel like it perfectly represented the way not only that parent loss can feel so unmooring, but also just really put into words, I found myself wanting to just like snap pictures of every page and send them to my friends who are asking me, How

can I support you? What's going on for you? Right, she really really did a great job of explaining and showing like, this is what it looks like. This is how it feels to kind of live without a parent to contend with that loss. And I think that this could be a great read for anybody whether that's a personal experience for you or not, again, like a previous book that I brought to the big show to discuss with Kaytee in Malagash, this one will keep you in your feels for just long enough to really feel something and then pull you out before it starts to feel too overwhelming. Right? There's levity and joy and hope still amongst the grief and the sadness. And that I think makes it and not easy read, but maybe easier to contend with than you would anticipate for this topic that is Dancing at the Pity Party by Tyler Feder.
