This is a debut YA novel from 2020 that was pressed into my hands by bookish friend Aimee Iniquez and was right up my alley. Our main character is Pony. He is trans and just started at a

new school and is trying to fly under the radar. This is known as "going stealth". So he's starting school without all the baggage of having been known by his dead name and his assigned gender at birth. But that means that every bathroom break is a little bit terrifying, that someone could find out his secret at any moment because he doesn't want all the weight of like being picked on by the jocks and the everybody, right? We also meet Georgia. She's a cheerleader at the school who runs with the popular crowd but wonders if this year she'd like to focus more on academics, or if that'll kill her reputation. Either way, she's for sure not dating this year, because this is a wide net. Well, on the first day of school, when Georgia and Pony lock eyes, they both have something to lose if they pursue their obvious connection. Now with the name Pony and the title Stay Gold, readers of a certain age will notice the outward connections to The Outsiders by S.E Hinton. There are absolutely coming of age and fitting in storylines here, just like the classic novel. I did find a tweet from S. E. Hinton from about a month before this book released, who posits that this book is a total ripoff of The Outsiders? She is spicy and fiery on Twitter?

And there's also a scene that's really rife with anti-trans sentiment and some violence. It's hard to read, especially if this journey is personal to you or a loved one. Anyway. All that being said, I gave it five stars. I binge listened to it in a single day. I loved it from beginning to end. I was so glad that Aimee pressed it into our bookish friends hands. It's Stay Gold by Tobly McSmith.

This is Scorpica by G.R. McAllister. I loved this one. Here's the setup. When our story starts, there has been 500 years of peace between the five queendoms of our story, but that ends when girls inexplicably stop being born. As the drought of girls, which is what it's called, lasts years and years and years, it sets of a cascade of political and personal consequences across all five queendoms of this known world, throwing long standing alliances out the window as each queendom begins to turn on each other, and

new threats to each nation rise from within. This book is so good. Okay, we've got a warrior queen, who must rise from the childbirth bed. She has just given birth to fight for her life and her throne. This was an epically memorable scene. We have a healer in hiding trying to protect the secret of her daughter's forbidden power. We have a queen whose visceral desperation to retain her power leads her to risk using some very dark magic. We have a really wonderful magic system, which is drawn from sand. It's so cool. I loved the world building. I loved the magic system in Scorpica. The history and structure of the five queendoms was fascinating. And I was taken in from the beginning. There's the Amazon like Scorpicans who depend on their ability to produce daughters to join their warrior ranks, and as their nation dwindles, all manner of unrest begins to grow amongst the Scorpicans. And then there's the magical Arcans, the record keeping Bastion, the farming Sestia, and the traders TRADERS of Paxim. So these are our five Queendoms. And all the Queendoms are ruled by women. And they depend on daughters to be their heirs. So basically, this is a story where you come for the matriarchy, but you stay for the fantastic storytelling. It's so well done here. I especially like the sections on Arca because that region has its own specific politics, and this very specific magic. And it was almost like a story within the story. I think those sections were my favorite, but I loved all of it. I think part of the reason this was such a big hit for me, and I'm finding this over and over again is that there were plenty of characters to root for. But there were an equal number of characters to really hate. And I really liked that mix. And then there were some characters that were one and switched to the other halfway through. But in ways that made sense. And this just made it so page turning because you just you everything was very fluid. You just didn't know what was going to happen. Next, we come at the story from multiple points of view. And I loved the fact that we kept getting more and more interesting characters. As I get to each new chapter, I would say, Ooh, she's interesting. I will say that there's plenty of gory battle and that there are some scenes involving several different kinds of sex. This did not involve very much of the book and I don't feel like it was the focus of the book at all but I would be remiss if I didn't at least say that it's in there, right. We're all trying to protect Mindy from these kinds of reads. If you like novels with good examples of female friendship, this is going to be a novel for you. If you like warrior women who rule with strength, but also wisdom and female heart, this book will be for you. If you like Circe, this book will be for you. I should mention that it says there right on the cover of this book that this is book one of the five queendom series. And so while most of the big plot questions are wrapped up at the end of this book, we also have a clear bridge to the next book happening. That didn't bother me at all. There was plenty of resolution. There's no release date yet for the second book, but I can promise you I will be pre ordering it from my indie the second it is. This is Scorpica by G R. McCallister.

Okay. Well, first, let me say there are 5000 ratings on Goodreads. And if you count four and five stars, 90% of people loved this book. I am an outlier. Okay, so Tomorrow and Tomorrow and Tomorrow is the newest release from Gabrielle Zevin, author of books that I have really loved in the past including The Storied Life of A.J. Fickry and Young Jane Young, both fantastic novels. This book was highly anticipated by so many in the bookish community. Our main characters are Sam and Sadie. They first met as young kids in a hospital. Sam was there having another surgery on the foot that was crushed in a car accident. Sadie was there because her sister was undergoing chemo. So they're both there a lot. It's enough time that they get to spend in like recovery rooms, playing games together, especially Oregon Trail that a friendship does form. That was the beginning of a friendship that quickly crashed into a fiery crater. But then is rekindled more than a decade later at a subway station in Boston. It then spans states and decades and success and heartbreak, and disability and death. This book is really a book about friendship, but the backdrop is video games. Soon after that new meeting Sam and Sadie decided to collaborate on a video game. And within just a few months, they are stars, young video game stars, having pulled together the groundbreaking game Ichigo. The two of them are complex and fully drawn characters. The side characters are rich and vibrant, even the ones you love to hate, and definitely marks one of my very favorite people in the book. And let me tell you, most people love this. For me, however, this book was a slog. It is 416 pages, and for me that was too long by a solid 100 pages. Mary did let me know when I recorded with her last and I had already started it that you don't become really invested in it until about halfway. That was true for me. I pushed to that halfway point and by then I did care about the characters and what was happening to them, especially Sadie, Sam and Marx. But that means I had already read 200 pages where I was really bored often, and feeling like nothing was happening. I've heard regularly that you don't need to care very much about video games to care about this book. And I don't care about video games except for Oregon Trail because I'm a child of the 80s. But that's about it. Overall, I found this book to be too big for its britches, and that bummed me out more than anything. I wanted another hit out of the park from Gabrielle Zevin because I adore her writing. Our sweet Mary though gave it five stars and calls it a work of art. Publishers Weekly called

it one of a kind as an achievement. I found it to be dull and overwrought. But I will admit that I finished that second 50% in about three days versus the first 50% which took me more than 10 because I was plodding so hard through it. So I ended up giving it two and a half to three stars. And it's Tomorrow and Tomorrow and Tomorrow by Gabrielle Zevin.

Okay, so we're going from a big book that everybody has heard about to a book that I will guarantee you most nobody has heard about, but you should because it's really really good. This is true crime and it is called The Suspicions of Mr. Whicher, A Shocking Murder and the Undoing of a Great Victorian Detective by Kate Summerscale. Okay HSPs you need to muffin for a second because even the setup of this is hard, but I can't get around it. This is true crime. All right. It's the shocking nature of the murder that made this case so groundbreaking. Here's the setup. In June of 1860, little toddler boy, a three year old Saville Kent was found at the bottom of an outdoor privy with his throat slit. The crime horrified all of England and because of the press coverage, it led to a national obsession with the art, the brand new art in 1860 of crime detection, which is ironic because the case ends up destroying in the process the career of perhaps the greatest detective in the UK at the time. But in 1860 the quote unquote detective was a relatively new invention. There were only eight of them in all of England at that time, and they were rarely called out of London. But this crime was so shocking that Scotland Yard sent its best man to investigate. And that man was Jonathan Whicher. Whicher quickly believed the absolutely unbelievable that someone within Saville's family had killed the little boy. It was kind of a locked room situation. But without sufficient evidence or a confession, his case was circumstantial, and inspector Whicher returned to London in absolute shame, and he never really recovered, though he would be vindicated five years later. The real legacy that he leaves though, is that this case is often cited as the inspiration for so much detective fiction that came later and Jonathan Whicher is that prototype. So I had really been craving some good quality True Crime. Guys, I feel like a lot of true crime that's been coming out lately is either about a case I'm not interested in or doesn't have a resolution and or it's just badly written. And none of those things do it for me. So I was really excited when I was perusing the shelves at Half Price Books, which has become my go to place to look for true crime you're gonna be hearing about more good true crime coming, and I picked this one up. It was excellent. This book, like I said, is completely true. It's completely based in fact, but in its structure, it is modeled after a Victorian detective novel. Oh fun. The murder itself is horrible. And the set of suspects is small as we know someone in the house did it. Or we think we know that. Our lead character is that fantastic Jonathan Whicher, one of those eight Scotland Yard detectives, and he is exactly what you want in a detective. He is quiet. He is incredibly smart. He is very observant, and he is not afraid to get to the bottom of things, no matter how messy it means that he will get. This book takes us through the crime and the investigation after and then in the second half of the book, it gives us not only a full and complete resolution to what happened to this sweet boy, but it also helps us to see the back half of what should have been a successful detective career for poor Inspector Whicher. This book absolutely reads like the best Victorian novel, although it has much more accessible language and I'm so glad that I read it. If you like detective novels like Sherlock Holmes, and Agatha Christie, if you love the historical mysteries

by Anne Perry, if you really wish that Edgar Allan Poe had written more about Auguste Dupin, or if you're obsessed with Jack the Ripper, this book will be for you. This is The Suspicions of Mr. Whicher by Kate Summerscale. Alright, what's your third book?

This was a May pick for the Indie Press List from Cafe Con Libros in Brooklyn, New York. Adriana Herrera has written a metric ton of romance over the years of her career, and this is her latest release, which came out in May of 2022. Her bio says she loves writing stories about people who look and sound like her, people getting unapologetic happy endings. And so we travel abroad to Paris in 1889, to the Exposition Universelle, where merchants from all corners of the globe will showcase their wares. Luz Alana Heith-Benzan arrives with 300 casks of rum from her family's employee owned distillery, ready to take on the world as one of the only women participating in the exposition. When her table is unceremoniously taken over by James Evanston Sinclair, he goes by Evan, the Scottish Earl of Darnick, she has to stand up for herself and she walks away feeling frustrated but vindicated. Evan however, walks away, utterly entranced by this fiery femme fatale from Santa Domingo. What follows is a marriage of convenience trope in which they both further their own aims, but feelings grow anyway. This is the first in Herrera's new series entitled Las Leonas, which are The Lionesses. This group of friends must each get their own book because it's a series eventually and I am for it. The steam factor here is off the charts. Fantastic. Yep. As in when I thought about Mindy listening to the story, I cackled witchy laughter of glee, thinking about how much it would set her cheeks afire. Luz Alana and Evan both have strong personalities, an eye for business and take no ish from anyone. I pumped my fist in the air with feminist delight anytime Luz had to stand up for herself because she embodies the strong woman so well. When we set it up for the Indie Press List, we mentioned, Meredith that Herrera so seamlessly makes her romance diverse that you don't even notice it. It doesn't feel like a bingo card to check off. Instead, her characters are varied in race, class and sexuality. And it's just part of the story. If you're looking for an open door, historical romance that is feminist and diverse and sexy as all get out, look no further and clear your calendar because this is the perfect fit. It's A Caribbean Heiress in Paris by Adriana Herrera.

Okay, well, I am bringing my humdinger in the third spot, too, because I am so excited to talk about The Displacements by Bruce Holsinger. This book was probably my favorite book that I read over my summer break. I absolutely love it. I feel like I want to press it into everybody's hands because it's one of those books that most people will just be completely pulled into. So if you haven't heard about it, here's the setup. As we start our book, we meet the Larsen-Hall family who lives in Miami, Florida. The dad's a successful surgeon, mom Daphne is an artist. They've got three kids in their blended family. But then hurricane Luna, the world's first category six hurricane, hits Palm Beach and destroys it. Millions of people lose their homes and when I say lose their homes, I mean like the land it was built on is gone. They are, no one is rebuilding, it is gone. Houston is gone too. It's a big one guys. The family becomes separated and their lives are completely upended. They go from living the ultimate Miami luxe to being in a mass exodus of evacuees who are put into a FEMA mega shelter in a hot minute. They very quickly have to wrap their brains around this new normal and they have to survive in this new normal and very frankly, this family is not equipped to do a lot of surviving. But the fun doesn't end there. We also are following other characters, including a slimy insurance salesman turned drug dealer, and the badass woman who runs the mega shelter. And we've got a whole other cast of characters whose stories swirl around and then converge together to page turning ends. Kaytee, you know that I am all about Cli-fi right? Climate fiction. I love it. It's my new favorite genre. I feel like I could read them over and over and over again. This book has an amazingly propulsive plot. It has lots of details about the storm itself. Although my good friend Elizabeth Barnhill who recommended this to me from Fabled she did say she's the one she loved it but she said the one thing I wish I had more and more and more of was storm details. So this isn't a book that focuses the whole, the whole book is not about the storm. It's about storm and then aftermath. Okay, so we have the storm and it's and what happens afterwards. We have characters that you get to both see before and after the storm. And then you really have a lot of context about them and you care a lot about them. And then we have a through line of humanity, the whole way through that I think is just done really, really well. This was a surprisingly masterful read because I thought it was just going to be a summer thrill. This had so much more depth than that. I loved the family elements here, most completely. Bruce Holsinger does an amazing job of making us care about this family. And I couldn't help but put myself into the shoes of one particular character. And I was cringing and gasping out loud as things were happening to this character. I think it was so visceral because this book has so many details that make you feel as if you are the one going through the this displacement. The dawning knowledge that the life that you were living is now completely gone is absolutely horrifying. And it creeps up on you in this book in the most perfect way. I found myself

constantly looking around my house and thinking I need to be really grateful right now that I can like take a shower, and sleep in a bedroom with the door like these things were really occurring to me fast and furiously. So as I said, I'm all in for climate fiction. I feel like I could read it all day long. I feel like we need stories like this to show us what could happen if we don't make major change. And I think fiction is a really easy way for most of us to kind of get that drift. This is a five star read for me and it's one of those books that I think will please people who love character development, but won't leave behind those of us who love a good strong plotline. There's so much going on here, but the author never loses his thread or his through line. I absolutely love this book. And now I am interested in picking up The Gifted School which was by the same author. So this is The Displacements by Bruce Holsinger.

And I will continue to read whatever books he puts out, which I just checked, and the next one is expected in 2023, has a working title of The Celebrants because I just adore him. In this title we meet Patrick, his best friend of decades has just died from cancer. That happens off the page. That is before the book starts. His hurt is compounded by the fact that she was also his sister in law, having married his brother. At her funeral, said brother let's Patrick know that he has to check himself into rehab and he really needs Patrick to take their kids Maisie and Grant back home with him to Palm Springs, California. Patrick reluctantly agrees because he has to, but that means he's processing his recent grief and his older buried grief, all while trying to figure out how to Uncle these two kids full time. What follows is a summer that none of them will ever forget and a book that stamped itself on my heart. It could be the sarcastic and snarky way that Patrick doesn't follow the traditional parenting guidelines, yet loves these kids wholeheartedly. It could be my relationship with my own gay bestie and my kids Guncle and the way that so much of this felt like it could have been our own story, although hopefully not starting with my untimely death. It could have also been the summery vibes on the cover and reading it around my birthday that year, which for me, marks the start of summer.
